



Follow the Turning Leaves

Discover the autumnal allure of Georgetown with a scenic tour.

Day 1 offers farm delights at Bi-Water Farm & Greenhouse, downtown historic walks, and brewery treats. Day 2 explores quilt barn artistry and Keeneland's racing world. Day 3 invites apple picking adventures at Evans Orchard & Cider Mill, completed with a warm fried apple pie.

DAY 1

DOWN ON THE FARM Board a hayride and trundle into the pumpkin patch at the 185-acre [Bi-Water Farm & Greenhouse](#), a Kentucky Proud member and one of Georgetown's "Big 4 Farms." Tour the greenhouses, and shop for fall décor, candles, baked goods, fresh-picked apples, homemade fudge, jams and jellies and more. Munch on burgers and funnel cakes at the FarmHouse Grille for **lunch**.

WALK THROUGH TIME Stroll downtown's National Register Historic District on a two-mile [Historic Walking Tour](#) with a stop at the [Georgetown and Scott County Museum](#) to visit Pete the Talking Crow, among other exhibits. Afterward, enjoy time to shop the dozens of locally owned boutiques, all situated within a walkable six-block area.

BREWS AND CHEWS Spend a memorable Happy Hour at one of Kentucky's most popular taprooms, [Country Boy Brewing](#), for a tour and a beer tasting/cheese pairing. Afterward enjoy casual patio dining with a **light supper** provided by The Kitchen.

DAY 2

QUILTS SQUARED Follow the [Buffalo Gals Quilt Barn Trail](#) to see a cornucopia of traditional and contemporary patterns that adorn barns, yards and fences across the county. Built of wood and painted with care, these 8-foot and 4-foot squares are fascinating pieces of history preserved as roadside art.

A DAY AT THE RACES Catch the morning workouts at [Keeneland](#) as majestic thoroughbreds breeze trackside. An experienced Tour Guide will lead guests through the picturesque Keeneland Paddock, Grandstand and grounds renowned for their beauty while sharing the history of the grounds and an insider's view of operations for both racing and sales. Visits are especially exciting during thoroughbred racing's Spring and Fall Meets.

DINNER at [Local Feed Seasonal Kitchen + Craft Bar](#). Atmospheric at its location in a circa 1890s building constructed originally as an ice house and located across the street from Royal Spring, where Baptist minister Elijah Craig first distilled bourbon in 1789, Local Feed features scratch farm-to-table cooking paired with craft cocktails.

DAY 3

APPLE-CRISP AIR Explore [Evans Orchard & Cider Mill](#), a fifth-generation family farm and the only farm in central Kentucky with a cider mill. Spend the morning touring the farm where more than 25 varieties of apples are grown with U-pick opportunities for apples, pears and berries. Browse the gift shop, packed with homemade jams and jellies, local honey, home décor, fresh baked goods, candles, homemade soaps—even toys. Bite into the farm’s famous fried apple pie at the Sweet Apple Café and sample the apple cider.

OPTION: Plan a visit around fun fall events like the Country Boy Brewing Fall Bazaar when local artists and crafters gather to show and sell their wares or the National Horse Show, a six-day hunter/jumper event consistently ranked by the North American Riders Group as one of the top shows in the United States, held at the Kentucky Horse Park. Both events take place in late October just as Georgetown College lines its campus with 100 carved and glowing Jack-O-Lanterns.
